



Dr. Gail Morgan is the Chair of the Committee on Diversity and Inclusion for the ACR's Commission on Women and Diversity. During her tenure, she has helped to spearhead the development of diversity committees in 30 ACR chapters to date.

Previously she served as President of the Washington State Radiological Society, and was inaugural chair of the state's diversity committee, which was the first ever established in the American College of Radiology.

Dr. Morgan attended Duke University for her undergraduate studies, where she was Angier B. Duke Scholar. Her older brother attended Duke before her, and it was the family joke that she followed him everywhere. She attended Howard University College of Medicine, again following in her brother's footsteps.

She started in pediatrics at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston, Texas. She became inspired by the work of pediatric radiologists she encountered, and decided to pursue a diagnostic radiology residency at the University of Texas/MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston.

She completed a fellowship in body imaging at the University of Maryland in Baltimore and was hired to join the staff at Virginia Mason Medical Center in Seattle, Washington, and spent 32 years on the West Coast.

While at Virginia Mason, she was asked to join the breast imaging staff when a vacancy unexpectedly arose. She later became Section Head of Breast Imaging followed by Section Head of Eastside Satellite Radiology Clinics.

She enjoyed teaching in the Radiology Residency Program as the faculty Teaching Coordinator for breast imaging and later ultrasound for many years, and also participated in sonographer training and education as well.

She has served in leadership positions in the National Medical Association on the Board of Trustees and as Chair of its national Nominating Committee, and in the Washington state AMA chapter as Chair of the Committee on Women Physicians.

Outside of medicine, she has been active in the community, serving on the Boards of the Seattle Art Museum and the Seattle Repertory Jazz Orchestra among several organizations.

She, her husband, and teenage daughter have recently relocated to Atlanta, Georgia to join their families. As a recent transfer to the Georgia Radiological Society she moderated its first diversity forum on Systemic Racism this summer, and was appointed co-chair of its new task force to address disparities in breast cancer screening and diagnosis in underserved populations in Georgia.

Personal hobbies have included skiing and scuba diving in years past, but she now enjoys reading, culinary pursuits and needle crafts in her spare time.
